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SATURDAY night on the south coast. I'm at Brighton's Old Market theatre, chatting with comedian Geoff Norcott before he's due on stage.

Could be a tough crowd tonight, I suggest. This, after all, is hardcore Remain territory. And Geoff is that rarest of acts – a stand-up who voted Leave and

supports the Tories.
"I'm presuming Brighton's going to "I'm presuming Brighton's going to be full of nice people wearing hemp berets," he chuckles. "But who knows? It might kick off. They might have had too much organic cider." Actually, I say "acts" but there's noth-ing fake about Geoff's on-stage persona - that of "an ordinary bloke with maybe slightly old-fashioned opinions."

"Some people wonder about the authenticity of my viewpoint," he tells me. "They think I'm playing a character. That I secretly go home and

chant, 'Oh, Jeremy Corbyn', and knit my own under-wear. But I wouldn't be comfortable pretending to be something I'm not."

Gobby

Not that a Geoff Norcott gig, let me stress, is some kind of far-right, racist rally.

Geoff is just a working-class 42-year-old South Londoner, who's swimming against the tide of political correctness that dominates today's stand-up scene and

today's stanted parties and point. So, OK, he'll never go down a storm with snowflakes, but this latest UK tour, Taking Liberties, is selling nicely, thanks.

Geoff's not on some kind of mission to "convert" his audiences.

"I'm not there to educate," he insists.

"Absolutely not. I always put the laugh a long way ahead of anything else. There's

no higher purpose to it."

But he does enjoy the challenge of a crowd that isn't fully on-side. "A reluctant laugh is a brilliant sound," he admits. "I

took the show to Glasgow. I insisted I wanted to go there. You'd think, ooh, an English Tory Leave voter in Glasgow? But that audience was fantastic."

Like any stand-up, Geoff will get grief from the odd gobby type in the crowd -sometimes more than just a half-baked heckle "I've been threatened," he says

But it's not always been because of his politics. "One guy was so drunk he mistook me for the previous comic, who'd been putting him down for being bald. "He'd gone to the bar, drunk two whiskies and tried to start on me. He wanted to talk it through in the car park."

to talk it through in the car park..."

It helps that Geoff has been in this game a long time. His centre-right political stuff has come political stuff has come about more recently, earning him wider attention ("There's something inherently funny about standing up for the Tories...").

But he's played the circuit since 2001, starting at clubs that couldn't help but toughen him up. "You never feel more alive than

never feel more alive than when it's kicking off all around you," he admits.

Geoff is convinced that FUNNY TORY: Geoff going out on the road is the best way to get the true measure of Britain right now. "You're reminded that

people are still grown-ups.
"The majority aren't having the sort of dialogue you get on social media - what Sam Smith's calling himself this wek.

Sam Smith's calling himself this week. They're just getting on with their lives."
