JENNY Eclair sounds exasperated. The guys who make Shreddies fart pants still haven't called.

She's convinced they'd be the perfect backers for Older And Wider, the hilarious but as-yetunsponsored podcast she makes with her pal Judith Holder.
"We talk about them quite a lot,"

she sighs, "and their PRs just haven't picked it up." It's almost as if the makers of

Shreddies fart pants feel they're above that sort of thing, I suggest.

"What? They think they're above us?" she cries. Luckily, Jenny has other sources of income to keep the wolf well away from the door.

Not just the stand-up comedy with which she made her name but her other, more recent career as a novelist. She's just published book number five, Inheritance.

Centred on a huge old house in Cornwall passed down through generations of a posh but deeply dysfunctional family, it's been getting rave reviews.

Bouffant

Jenny admits she sees herself in several of the characters she dreamed up for the story, including a working class girl tangled up in this privileged family's world.
"I identify as much with her as anybody," she says.
"I've been a shop girl, I've had a blonde bouffant, I've slept with the wrong men."
Her stand-up stuff inevitably gets put on hold while she's working on a book. But when she does get to step out several of the characters she

does get to step out on stage, 59-year-old Jenny still loves grabbing attention.

Strutting out in just her bra and pants, for example. How much courage did that take?

"Oh, probably the least courage of anything I've ever had to do on stage," explaining it was her tour manager's idea. "It was a great joke. It got the right reaction every time."

"Obviously I have to be the centre of attention when I'm on stage," she concedes, "otherwise I've kind of lost it. But I can't keep it up. I'm not at full tilt all my life."

One of the things people love about Jenny is her refusal to take herself too seriously. Mention any reality TV show she's done and

she'll poke fun at own efforts.

"I'm one of those people who thinks they

people who timins they might win, even though they can't do anything" she insists. What about Celebrity MasterChef? "They saw straight through me. I have the kitchen skills of a 10-year-old..."

What about I'm A Celeb? Jenny came third on that, back in 2010. That was a genuine achievement, right? "Yeah, but you
